

HHS agencies work together to protect Americans' health and prevent disease. CHF advocates for increased funding across HHS agencies and asks that Congress robustly fund LHHS priorities that protect the health of all Americans.



In FY21 the White House invested \$42.5B for the National Drug Control Program, which included funding to HHS for the establishment of their Overdose Prevention Strategy. The following are some examples of FY21 agency efforts.

CDC **CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL & PREVENTION**

Awarded \$300M through Overdose Data to Action, which helps states and cities collect high quality and timely data on non-fatal and fatal overdoses, which informs interventions.

ACF **ADMINISTRATION FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES**

Awarded \$8.8M in grants to increase well-being and enhance the safety of children who are in or at risk of an out-of-home placement due to caregiver substance misuse.

FDA **FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION**

Facilitated the distribution of FDA-approved naloxone products, which help increase availability of naloxone across the country. This helps ensure the health and safety of Americans.

NIH **NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH**

Awarded several millions in grants through the HEAL Initiative to research dedicated to new treatments, harm reduction strategies, and nonpharmacological pain management.

SAMHSA **SUBSTANCE ABUSE AND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ADMINISTRATION**

Awarded more than \$3B for the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant Program, which allows states and territories to provide stronger treatment programs.

HRSA **HEALTH RESOURCES AND SERVICES ADMINISTRATION**

Developed the Rural Communities Opioid Response Program, awarding \$104M to groups providing treatment in opioid misuse high risk rural areas across the country.

IHS

INDIAN HEALTH SERVICES

Continue to maintain the IHS National Committee on Heroin, Opioids, and Pain Efforts, which created five workgroups dedicated to different components of opioid misuse response.

The HEAL Initiative

The **NIH** and **SAMSHA** conducted a study testing proven prevention and treatment methods in 67 communities across four states hard-hit by the opioid crisis.

National Harm Reduction Technical Assistance Center

SAMSHA and **CDC** developed the National Harm Reduction Technical Assistance Center, which provides free help to any providers of harm reduction services, specifically harm from opioid use disorders. This includes comprehensive support of opioid misuse harm reduction integration into primary medical care.

Behavioral Health Workforce Education and Training

Program for Parprofessionals

HRSA and CDC developed an initiative to expand community-based training for peer support specialists, with a focus on those within the opioid misuse space.
